- Transit Operator Safety Dean Henkemeyer, Josh Sachs, Scott Stark, St. Cloud Metro Bus
 This session will look at violence awareness and prevention as well as other safety related concerns,
 such as a work/life balance, fatigue, continued professional development, morale, etc. There are many
 issues that affect operators on a daily basis and can directly or indirectly impact operator safety. We
 will take this opportunity to share what Transit Operator Safety may look like from various
 perspectives and have a conversation about what you and your colleagues are doing to support the
 operators at your agencies.
- Transit's Impact on the Economy and Economic Development *Lucy Galbraith, Metro Transit; Jeremy Mattson, NDSU*

The availability of transit service has a direct impact on economic development. Transit Oriented Development (TOD) benefits communities with additional benefits thanks to the presence of transit. Jeremy will describe the different types of benefits and economic impacts provided by rural transit and how these could be measured. A current study of the economic benefits of rural and small urban transit in Minnesota will be discussed, and early findings from a series of case studies across the state will be presented.

What are the hot new apps, products and tools that can make your life easier? Andrew will discuss strategies for identifying and prioritizing technology needs, as well as trends and opportunities in transit technology at the national level. Mark's presentation will cover important information about a planned Technology Assessment for transit systems in Minnesota, as well as work being done in the state around connected and autonomous vehicles.

Micro Transit and Role of TNCs – Matt Fyten, SouthWest Transit; Meredith Klekotka, Metro Transit
Many transit systems face the first-mile/last-mile challenge as they work to attract more riders. With a
changing landscape that includes ride sharing, how can transit systems compete and work with other
providers to give customers what they need? This session will give you an update on the SouthWest
Prime On-Demand Service, as well as what future trends can be expected in terms of micro transit and
Transportation Network Companies (TNCs) expansion, which we're seeing with car pool service and
assisted ride service.

You will learn the roles and responsibilities of FTA, MnDOT and sub-recipients, and the programs activities and services that require DBE goals and regulations. We will provide tools, resources and best practices for obtaining DBE participation in Greater Minnesota Transit. We will demo MnDOT's geographic mapping tool that is used to locate DBE(s) anywhere in the State.
