

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law [BIL]:

- In 2021, the BIL enacted as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act [IIJA] was signed into law by President Biden.
- BIL/IIJA is the largest federal investment in public transportation.
- The legislation authorized up to \$108 billion to support public transportation programs with \$91 billion in guaranteed funding.
- Several new discretionary funding programs







Competitive Environment

- RAISE Program (2023)
 - \$2.2B Available
 - 1,100 Total Applications
 - \$15B in Total Requests
 - 162 Awarded Projects
 - 14.7% Success Rate
- Safe Streets for All (SS4A) (2022)
 - \$800M Available
 - 673 Total Applications
 - \$13.3B in Total Requests
 - 510 Awarded Projects (Some Partial)
 - 28% Success Rate

- Reconnecting Communities (2022)
 - \$185M Available
 - 414 Total Applications
 - \$1.9B in Total Requests
 - 45 Awarded Projects
 - 11% Success Rate
- INFRA
 - \$1.5B Available
 - 329 Total Applications
 - \$28.9B in Total Requests
 - 26 Awarded Projects
 - 8% Success Rate



Grant Programs:

 - Authorized surface transportation programs from FY2022 through FY2026.
 - o Provided advanced appropriations for various grant programs.

Section 5337 (State of Good Repair)	Formula	Provides capital assistance for maintenance, replacement, and rehabilitation projects to help transit agencies maintain assets in a state of good repair in urbanized areas. Apportioned annually. The FTA match 80%, Local match 20%
Section 5339(a) (Buses & Bus Facilities)	Formula	Funds capital projects to replace, rehab and purchase buses and bus-related equipment, and construct bus-related facilities. Apportioned annually FTA match 80%, Local match 20%

Accelerating Innovative Mobility	Competitive	Funds advance transit innovative projects. NOFO issued annually FTA match 80%, Local match 20%
All Stations Accessibility Program	Competitive	Funds capital improvement projects at legacy stations or passenger facilities or planning studies to develop plans for public transportation projects. ADA improvements NOFO issued annually FTA match 80% & planning 50% Local match 20% & planning 50%
Areas of Persistent Poverty	Competitive	Funds planning studies or financial plans to improve transit services in distressed areas. NOFO issued annually FTA match 80%, Local match 20%

Section 5312 (Mobility on Demand Sandbox Demonstration Program)	Competitive	Innovative projects that deliver high-quality, seamless, and equitable mobility options for all travelers. (bike/car share, on-demand bus) NOFO issued annually FTA match 80%, Local 20%

Tribal Transit Formula Grants (5311[c][1][B])	Formula	Funds public transportation service operations on and around Indian reservations or tribal land in rural areas. Apportioned annually Federal/local match 50%/50% (operating) Federal/Local match 80%/20% (capital)
Tribal Transit Grants (5311[c][1][B])	Competitive	Twenty percent of 5311 formula funds distributed on a competitive basis. NOFO issued annually Federal/Local match 80%/20%

USDOT Discretionary Grant Programs



RAISE Grant Program

- Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant funds capital investments in, and planning and design for, surface transportation infrastructure that has significant local or regional impact.
- Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is issued annually.
- RAISE Grant program criteria include:
 - o Safety
 - o Environmental Sustainability
 - o Quality of Life
 - o Improves Mobility and Community Connectivity





RAISE Grant Program

- RAISE Grant program criteria include:
 - Economic Competitiveness and Opportunity: Applicants must ensure their projects align with the economic competitiveness opportunity criterion in the NOFO.
 - State of Good Repair: Elements of applicants' state of good repair policies and procedures must be included in the application.
 - Partnership and Collaboration: Applicants must address partnership and collaborative efforts with project partners to meet this criterion
 - Innovation: This criterion could include innovative technology or financing

RAISE Grant Program

Grant Eligible Projects/Types:

- o Highway & Bridge, public transportation
- Passenger and freight rail and port infrastructure
- Surface transportation facilities located on Tribal lands (where Federal Government is responsible for maintenance, planning and design activities).
- Surface transportation components of an airport project
- o Replace/rehabilitate of a culvert or prevent stormwater runoff to improve habitat for aquatic species.

Grant Funding Min/Max:

- Minimum award in urban areas is \$5 million and \$1 million for rural areas
- No minimum award for planning projects

Cost Sharing/Matching:

- Exactly 50% of funds split between urban and rural projects
- Federal share 80% and can be increased in rural areas, historically disadvantaged communities or areas of persistent poverty).







Safe Streets for All (SS4A)

- Safe Streets for All (SS4A) funds roadway safety improvements to reduce or eliminate roadway fatalities and serious injuries through safety action plan development, refinement, and implementation for all users.
- Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is issued annually.
- SS4A Grant program criteria includes:
 - Safety Impact show significant reduction or elimination of roadway fatalities and serious injuries
 - o Equity, Engagement, and Collaboration supports legislative requirements to assess the extent to which equitable investments in the safety needs of underserved communities.
 - Effective Practices and Strategies DOT will assess the extent to which the applicant demonstrates how the application responds to policies, guidelines, standards, and practices to promote systemic safety improvements.
 - Other DOT strategic Goals demonstrate how equity and safety show significant reduction or elimination in roadway fatalities and serious injuries.








Safe Streets for All (SS4A)

- Grant Eligible Projects/Types:
 - Planning and Demonstration Projects develop an action plan, conduct supplemental safety planning to enhance and action plan, and carry demonstration activities to inform the development of, or an update to an action plan.
 - Implementation Grants funding for projects and strategies identified in an action plan that addresses roadway safety problems.
- Project Funding Min/Max size:
 - Planning and Demonstration Projects: \$100,000 (min)/\$10 million (max)
 - Implementation Grant Projects: \$2.5 (min)/\$25 million (max)
- Local match requirements rural vs. urban
 - o Federal match requirement 80%
 - o Urban/rural match requirement no less than 20%

Grant Strategy and Development

Grant Administration if selected / Formal application debrief if not selected

- If award made, move toward grant obligation and administration process
- If not selected, conduct a formal debriefing with the lead federal agency to improve future submissions

Project Strategy, Prioritization, and Selection for Grants

- Assess projects agency-wide
- Align projects with the appropriate funding program
- Determine scope enhancements to make projects more competitive

Proactively Prepare for NOFO and Applications

- Collect scope, schedule, budget
 - Engineering reports
 - NEPA assessments
 - Traffic/safety date
 - Build support coalition

Post Application Process Review

- Internal review grant development process seeking opportunities for improvement

Active Grant Development

- NOFO assessment
- Assign grant development team
- Iterative grant development/review process
 - Submit application(s)

You don't have to (and shouldn't) go it alone...

- Get organized and establish a grant development team (Plan the work, then work the plan!)
- Communicate with project leaders/engineers/planners for data, reports, research, and other information needed
- Set a clear application development schedule and assignments

Other Useful Tips/Tricks

- READ THE NOFO, then... read it again!
- Initiate Benefit-Cost Analysis ASAP Get help if needed
- Commit needed local matching funds (No 'check's in the mail')
- Utilize embedded hyperlinks to support assertions
- Refer to other portions of the application to reduce redundancy
- Login to Grants.gov, or another agency submission site several days prior to the deadline
 - Know your DUNS Number, Unique Entity Identifier, or other credentials needed to submit ahead of deadlines
- Schedule grant development process to submit at least 2 days ahead of the deadline
- QA/QC is a critical


ACTION: Notice of Funding Opportunity

SUMMARY: The purpose of this notice is to solicit applications for Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grants. Funds for the FY 2022 RAISE grant program are to be awarded on a competitive basis for surface transportation infrastructure projects that will have a significant local or regional impact. This program is referred to as the Local and Regional Project Assistance Program in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

DATES: Applications must be submitted by 5:00 PM Eastern on April 14, 2022.

ADDRESSES: Applications must be submitted through Grants.gov.
